Fred Pasco Green

Fred Pasco Green, one of the best known and most highly esteemed residents of the Fruitland Peninsula, died at his home at Pomona shortly after midnight Sunday, following a short illness with pneumonia. He was taken ill Wednesday and at first his condition was not regarded as necessarily critical, but he gradually and steadily grew weaker, until he sank into that sleep that knows no awakening until the resurrection morn.

The deceased was a native of this county, having been born thirty-six years ago at the family home near Pomona. He was educated in the public schools of his section and at a business college in Montgomery, and it was while there that he met the young lady, Miss Lillie Sellers, who afterwards became his wife.

Few young men in Putnam County had more friends or stood in higher esteem. He had served for several terms as mayor of Pomona, a member of the town council, and town club and treasurer. He was a loyal friend, a faithful member and officer of the church and a devoted son, husband and parent.

His passing from a life of usefulness is sincerely deplored not only by the community, in which he had spent the greater part of his life, but by the entire county. He is survived by his wife and one son, Fred; and by his mother, Mrs. S. S. Green of Pomona, and by three sisters, Mrs. W. F. Reed of Georgetown, Miss Florence Green of Pomona, and Miss Mary Green of Jacksonville, and one brother, Causey S. Green, the well known attorney of Palatka.

The funeral was held yesterday afternoon at 2 o'clock from the Pomona church, Rev. R. E. Newton, the pastor, conducting the impressive service. The interment was in the Georgetown Cemetery. W. C. Davis, the Palatka funeral director, had charge of the arrangements.

A large number of friends from Palatka and various points of the county attended and paid their last tribute of respect. The floral offerings were both numerous and handsome, and bore mute testimony of the love and esteem from friends and relatives far and near.
